##### Russia's Goal to Distract NATO?

The Baltic Sea is a key strategic region where the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and Russian military and economic interests overlap. Following the Invasion of Ukraine, speculation of other potential areas of attack has signaled that conflict in the region is no longer off of the table. Gray zone operations are underway, and the United States, NATO, and their partners need to be ready to act in unity against an increasingly hostile Russia.

Russia's actions in Ukraine have demonstrated that it is willing to use its military power to achieve its goals.

Conflict in the Baltic will take place in every domain—air, sea, land, space, and cyber—and NATO must have a

strategic response to ensure that the alliance can effectively respond to a crisis.

Control of the maritime domain and suppression of Russian anti-access, area denial (A2AD) capabilities will be crucial to that response. Ironically, the most important preparation has been the solidifying of partnerships and alliances—an unintended consequence of Putin's war.

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This paper outlines how NATO needs a clear strategy to respond to a Russian Baltic playbook: full spectrum gray zone operations, economic coercion, disinformation and propaganda, cyber disruption, and cover military incursions.
